A Few Simple Notes from the Director

Liturgical Updates

Beginning with the Vigil Mass for the First Sunday of Lent (Saturday, February 17, 2024), we will resume three liturgical practices that were put on hold because of COVID-19. Please help us spread the word, and if you have any questions or concerns, please let me know.

- (1) We will resume the practice of having the bread and wine brought forward as part of the preparation of the altar and gifts. As the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) states, "It is praiseworthy for the bread and wine to be presented by the faithful." In the early Christian communities, the bread and wine were brought from the homes of the faithful gathered for Mass. And even though this is no longer the practice of the Church, having members of the congregation bring forth the bread and wine symbolizes the giving of ourselves to God to do whatever God wishes to do with us, the mystical Body of Christ. Returning to this simple but powerful practice will help us recall the sacrificial and communal natures of the Mass.
- (2) We will also resume the practice of distributing the Body of Christ in the middle aisle and then returning to our seats by way of the side aisles. More preference than a liturgical norm, the center aisle is the "ordinary" place where the faithful go to receive in most churches. There is no right or wrong place to receive, but as many of you know, before COVID, the center aisle was the Shrine's norm. It seems most fitting then, that we return to the distribution of Holy Communion from this "central place" in the church.
- (3) Finally, we will resume the practice of offering the Precious Blood at all of our weekend liturgies. While we receive the fullness of the Body and Blood of Christ with the reception of just one species, the GIRM is clear: "It is desirable that in keeping with the Lord's command, his Body and Blood should be received as spiritual food by the faithful who are properly disposed." Because illness and germs still exist, we ask that each person discern whether it is appropriate for them to receive from the chalice each week. If you are immunocompromised or feeling sick, we ask that you not receive from the chalice and enjoy the fullness of God's Body and Blood through the reception of the consecrated host. One final note from the GIRM worth mentioning: "When receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence and receives the Body of the Lord from the minister. The consecrated host may be received either on the tongue or in the hand, at the discretion of each communicant. When Holy Communion is received under both kinds, the sign of reverence is also made before receiving the Precious Blood." In other words, the proper way to reverence the Blessed Sacrament when in line to receive either Eucharistic element is a simple bow.

Your help and patience as we return to these liturgical practices is appreciated! While relatively small, we hope these practices help us pray and celebrate better.

If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.
